#### **Parent Conferences**

Family-Teacher Conferences are just around the corner, and we would like to share information and encourage everyone to take advantage of this partnership opportunity.

November 20<sup>th</sup> and 21st are the days scheduled for face to face conferences. Families that are otherwise unavailable to attend conferences will be provided the same information via packet/email.

Conferences will be held in person on Monday, November 20<sup>th</sup>, from 12pm - 7pm, and on Tuesday, November 21st from 9am - 3pm. Conferences will be scheduled in 20 minute blocks, which allows for about 15 minutes of conversation and a short buffer to make sure we stay on time.

#### **Reminders and Requests**

**Cell phones:** We ask that students put away their cell phones and devices during the school day. These devices are simply a distraction to the learning environment. One thing we have noticed, particularly at our middle grades, is that students are using the devices during the day to communicate with each other and even to communicate with home. Our request is to contact the office to get messages to your student, save family texts until the school day is complete, and/or require your student to have their phone off during the school day—when they turn it back on at the end of the day messages are delivered and class interruption is avoided.

**Dress Code:** One the founding practices here at CCCS is our dress code. While the specifics have changed a bit over time, the benefits of the dress code have been a hallmark of our school, is a Board level discussion and policy, and is one of the expectations when families choose to attend CCCS. Teacher time taken to reinforce dress code expectations takes away from instruction time, so we ask that families *please please please* please support the school and teacher time by ensuring students are following the expectations before coming to school each day.

**Morning Drop Off:** Please know that our cafeteria is open at 7:45 each morning for early drop. We usually have staffing that allows students the choice of playground time or hanging out in the cafeteria.

At 8:10 we really want to have students in their class, listening to announcements, and the halls clear of students and parents so we can get started right away. Parents: if you are chatting with another parent please come down to the office area to avoid disruption in our tiny hallway (sounds carry), and if you need to catch a teacher please help them by concluding your discussion before that bell.

Typically Dave is at the front door, Alissa is roaming and helping students, and Danielle or Charity are hovering near the office to be available for lunch monies, medication drop off, or any of the other myriad of things they manage for our school. Please catch us if we can be of any help.

**Church Parking Concern:** We had a concern shared with us about folks parking in the church lot for pick up, copied below. Please review if this applies and help us make sure we can continue to use their lot.

Countryside appreciates being able to serve the school with our available black topped parking lot. Increasingly however, students having crossed the street to arrive on the W Van Duyn Street sidewalk are leaving the sidewalk and walking through the parking lot. We have folks that are concerned about safety (and liability) and I have been tasked with renewing the request that students use the sidewalk until meeting their parents in the East lot, and not walking through the parking lot.

#### Mission/Vision work:

Soon the Board will be sending out information about the CCCS Mission & Vision Workshopping process that we will be undergoing this year. We hope to have many families involved in this process as it will directly affect all aspects of our school and community moving forward. Please be on the lookout for more information on this.

#### **Teaching and Learning:**

The Math Curriculum Adoption Process is underway; our teachers and a few parents have completed out initial perception surveys, and will next begin the long task of reviewing video presentations from about 10 different publishers to determine which ones best meet our needs.

#### Building & Grounds:

Many compliments have been received about our new patios lights out front. This mini project was completed to provide entry way light in the mornings, which as we get closer to winter can be rather dark when families are first arriving.

We have 4-5 sports groups signed up to use our gym space this winter—basketball and volleyball being the traditional indoor sports—and Kate Postma is running a sports conditioning class as well; you can contact her directly for information.

We are looking forward to working on the front beds, and are exploring options to dig out playground areas that are mostly dirt and back-fill in with more bark chips.

Mr. Kyler is keeping our little school bright and shiny each day, and is spending Fridays catching up on miscellaneous maintenance projects around the school.

#### Attendance Rate to date (10/18): 95.56%


Attendance is a critical factor in the success of individual students, and our school as a whole.

#### **Attendance (repeat)**

There is much research and many <u>resources</u> that support the importance of regular attendance and it's connection to school success. A number of districts run a campaign called "strive for five" to try and support good attendance. In general the benchmark schools look for is to have at least 95% attendance.

Missed class time affects the student as well as the classroom community as a whole. When sick it is best to stay home of course, but we want to strongly encourage folks to do the best with attendance as possible — we want our students here!

We also encourage families to schedule vacations around our breaks as much as possible. Please remember that 10 consecutive non-illness absences automatically un-enrolls a student statewide; at CCCS this would require returning to the waiting list in order to reenroll.







#### Kindergarten — Ms. Dunmire

October was jam packed with lots and lots of fun! This month, we focused on learning about pump-kins, more about our alphabet and segmenting words, learning to recognize patterns and making "I noticed" statements, starting to add numbers, counting in different ways, and growing together as a class! We had multiple birthdays, PJ day, STEM with our 6th grade buddies, and a total of THREE field trips! WOW! At the Johnson Brothers Garden Market, we planted flowers and had a scavenger hunt; Detering Orchards we picked pumpkins, had cider, and went on a hayride; and lastly, we went to the park and helped clean it up to better our local community. A highlight of the month was our pumpkin taste test as well!

Coming up in November, Kindergarten will learn more about weather and fall. What makes the leaves change and why it's getting colder! We will also learn more about addition, recognizing numbers in ten-frames, practicing our writing skills, continuing to learn our alphabet, learning to sound out CVC words, and becoming stronger readers. November also focuses on Gratitude for Character Strong, so our class will learn more about how to show we're grateful and what we can do for others.









#### First Grade — Mrs. Young and Mrs. Boyum

We had a wonderful October in 1st grade! We enjoyed several field trips, including the pumpkin patch, the Coburg bookstore, and the Coburg Candy Company. We also had Johnson Brothers Nursery come visit our classroom and do a fun project! In class we learned about Growth Mindset, studied the eclipse, and learned about Dia de los Muertos. The kiddos are becoming super readers and writers! We have been learning the "secret stories" behind the short vowels in reading along with learning spelling strategies to add to our "writing toolkits."

Coming up in November, we are going to celebrate Dia de los Muertos on November 2nd with calaveras de azucar, pan de muerto, horchata, and a little bit of Coco. :) Then we are finishing the month with a science unit on Light and Shadow, where we will explore the concepts of transparent, translucent, and opaque, and learn about how light travels. The kiddos will continue mastering their short vowel sounds and learn how to organize a story with a beginning, middle, and end. It will be a fun month!



#### Second grade — Ms. Smith

This month 2nd grade will be learning about regular and irregular geometric shapes using geoboards and geometric shape manipulatives. In reading, we will break into our new unit on informational texts using our MyView workbook. This unit focuses on identifying text structures, like we did with our poetry unit, and locating details in the text. 2nd grade continues to practice writing in a sequential order that has a clear beginning, middle, and end.

The month of November has a new Character Strong word to focus on for students Social Emotional learning. This month's word is gratitude which is fitting for the time of year!





#### Third grade — Mrs. Rutter

We are finishing up many units as we wrap up October. We finished our rounding, adding, and subtracting math unit, and took our first unit test. I am so impressed with how hard students have been working. We are jumping into multiplication and division, and students are seeing that it's not as scary as they may have thought. In reading, students are becoming more independent when looking for text evidence. We finished our first novel group book and will start reading about Sonia Sotomay-

er soon. We are doing our first research project and learning more about the town of Coburg and the history here. We are still working when to use commas in sentences, and will be expanding to paragraphs soon. In science we learned about magnets, electromagnets, and static electricity. We will be jumping into weather soon and looking at weather patterns. In all subject areas students are becoming more independent and have been working hard. It has been really fun to see.










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#### Fourth Grade - Mrs. Sepulveda

October in fourth grade has been pretty great! We finished our first novel group book "Home of the Brave" which was about a young African refugee boy experiencing America, and have started our second book Esperanza Rising" which is about a Mexican immigrant girl experiencing life during the great depression and working in the farm camps of California. They are incredible books and we have had many great discussions about both. In writing we have been working on a personal narrative and in science we have had a focus on energy and the different ways it can be transferred and transformed. Given that it is October, we have also had time for many fun activities and projects. The students became real estate agents and created advertisements

by bringing their haunted houses to life. We have also had the opportunity to venture to the Coburg Pioneer Cemetery twice for community days. The first time we learned about and found the graves of several Coburg founders. We also did some head stone rubbings. The second trip we did a scavenger hunt to learn more about the people buried in the pioneer cemetery. Both were great trips. I am grateful for the families that are willing to drive our crew around! Looking forward to November we are learning about Dia De Los Muertos, tessellations, and some fun writing and art projects. We'll also be choosing our countries to start our country

projects. Fun times in fourth grade!!









#### Fifth Grade - Ms. Schneider

There is no doubt that 5th grade has packed a lot into the month of October with overnight outdoor school, the Linn County Museum, a group presentation and our rigorous classroom learning. We are excited to be starting our second unit of study, which includes: decimals, the importance of observation, developing tools to focus, and planning our BizTown project fundraiser (just to name a few things).

















#### Sixth Grade - Mrs. DeRosia

October has flown by with our fabulous sixth graders! The highlight of our month has been all the time we've spent with our Kindergarten buddies. It has been a delight to see the relationships formed between the two classes through STEM projects, park clean-up, and our pumpkin patch field trip!

In our classroom, we have been continuing our imagination unit in ELA. We read and performed The Phantom Tollbooth play, and worked in groups to compare an excerpt of Alice's Adventures in Wonderland to media portrayals. This coming month, we will read some short stories, poetry, and our first novel!

In math, we have been working with fractions and decimals, which has been a great review from fifth grade. Soon, we will be moving on to algebraic expressions and properties.

October has been a busy month for 8th grade. We have been learning about the scientific method and inquiry in science and our language arts unit answers the essential question, *In what different ways can people be intelligent?* In Social Studies, October focuses on Government. Students completed a lengthy project to learn more about the amendments. In connection with this, our Community Days focus is Coburg City Hall. 8th grade has been lucky enough to see how our government works on a local level. We even had the opportunity to meet with Judge Williams, the local municipal Judge here! I had to also include a picture of some 1st grade buddy time: portraits of each other!








#### Music - Mrs. Vreim


